Smile Malawi was registered as a charity in England and Wales in 2004 and as an NGO in Malawi in June 2006. The main objective of the charity is to provide a home for street children from Blantyre, with educational and recreational facilities. There are estimated to be 3500 children sleeping and begging on the streets of the city. The charity also aims to help the local community of Ndokota by building a nursery school and health centre. It has already provided food for the village during the famine of 2005 and has recently completed a new deep borehole to supply the village with fresh water.

The Smile Malawi Childrens' Centre opened its doors to the first children in November 2006.

The children were jointly identified by Malawi Social Services and Smile Malawi from the streets of Blantyre. It was a harrowing experience for Malawian trustee Glad Munthali and Project Manager Charles Mwasinga. Seven girls and four boys were initially accepted, ranging from 3 to 12 years old.

budgets and future planning but she enjoyed plenty of time with the children and was impressed by their quick learning and development.

She soon visited the nearby primary school and arranged for the older children to start after Easter. A local tailor was found to make uniforms and the children were thrilled.



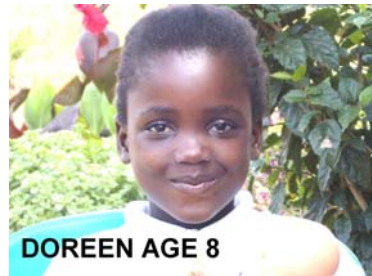
STELLA AGE 8
